in time for pope francis s new initiatives we now have the potential to end two thousand years of hostility will we succeed new in paperback with keen wisdom and a masterful understanding of history rabbi james rudin an acclaimed authority in the field of jewish christian relations provides the context necessary for christians and jews to recognize the critical challenges posed by the past and the future of their

two religions spanning twenty centuries of controversy horror and promise rudin s narrative examines the sources of both conflict and commonality between the two religions the need to address and redress past wrongs the agenda required to create a shared future free of bigotry it includes proven approaches for successful interreligious dialogues including tips on session organization project ideas and a discussion guide to enhance christians and jews knowledge of each other

the papers in this volume are organized around the ambition to reboot the writing of history about jews and christians in the first two centuries ce many are convinced of the need for a new perspective on this crucial period that saw both the birth of rabbinic judaism and apostolic christianity and their parting of ways yet the traditional paradigm of judaism and christianity as being two totally different systems of life and thought still predominates in thought handbooks and programs of research and teaching as a result the sources are still being read as reflecting two separate histories one jewish and the other christian the contributors to the present work were invited to attempt to approach the ancient jewish and christian sources as belonging to one single history precisely in order to get a better view of the process that separated both communities in doing so it is necessary to pay constant attention to the common factor affecting both communities the roman empire roman history and roman archaeology should provide the basis on which to study and write the shared history of jews and christians and the process of their separation a basic intuition is that the series of wars between jews and romans between 66 and 135 ce a phenomenon unrivalled in antiquity must have played a major role in this process thus the papers are arranged around three focal points 1 the varieties of jewish and christian expression in late second temple times 2 the socio economic military and ideological processes during the period of the revolts and 3 the post revolt jewish and christian identities that emerged as such the volume is part of a larger project that is to result in a source book and a history of jews and christians in the first and second centuries

this book reflects on one of the most pressing challenges of our time the current and historical relationships that exist between the faith traditions of judaism christianity and islam kessler s writings shed light on common purpose as well as how to manage difference

the present volume is based on a conference held in october 2019 at the faculty of theology of humboldt university berlin as part of a common project of the australian catholic university the katholieke universiteit leuven and the humboldt university berlin the aim is to discuss the relationships of jews and christians in the first two centuries ce against the background of recent debates which have called into question the image of parting ways for a description of the relationships of judaism and christianity in antiquity one objection raised against this metaphor is that it accentuates differences at the expense of commonalities another critique is that this image looks from a later perspective at historical developments which can hardly be grasped with such a metaphor it is more likely that distinctions between

jews christians jewish christians christian jews etc are more blurred than the image of parting ways allows in light of these considerations the contributions in this volume discuss the cogency of the parting of the ways model with a look at prominent early christian writers and places and suggest more appropriate metaphors to describe the relationships of jews and christians in the early period

the sabbath is the original feast day a day of joy and freedom from work a holy day that allows us to reconnect with god our fellows and nature now in a compelling blend of journalism scholarship and personal memoir christopher d ringwald examines the sabbath from creation to the present weaving together the stories of three families three religions and three thousand years of history a day apart is the first book to examine the sabbath in judaism christianity and islam a marvelously readable book it offers a fascinating portrait of the basics of the three sabbaths the muslim juma on friday the jewish shabbat on saturday and the christian lord s day on sunday and introduces us to three families including ringwald s own and shows how they observe the holy day and what it means to them the heart of the book recounts the history of the sabbath ranging from the creation story and moses on mount sinai to the teachings of jesus and muhammad the impact of the protestant reformation and the industrial revolution and the rise of the modern weekend ringwald shows that the sabbath instinct to observe a special day of withdrawal and repose is universal indeed all religions and philosophies teach that life is more than toil that time should be set aside for contemplation enjoyment and culture in today s frantic 24 7 world the sabbath a day devoted to rest and contemplation has never been more necessary a day apart offers a portrait of a truly timeless way to escape the everyday world and add meaning to our lives

traditional scholarship on the history of jewish christian relations has been largely based on the assumption that judaism and christianity were shaped by a definitive parting of the ways according to this model the two religions institutionalized their differences by the second century and thereafter developed in relative isolation from one another interacting mainly through polemical conflict and mutual misperception this volume grows out of a joint princeton oxford project dedicated to exploring the limits of the traditional model and to charting new directions for future research drawing on the expertise of scholars of both jewish studies and patristics it offers an interdisciplinary perspective on the interaction between jews and christians between the bar kokhba revolt and the rise of islam the contributors question the conventional wisdom concerning the formation of religious identity the interpenetration of jewish and christian traditions the fate of jewish christianity and the nature of religious polemics in late antiquity and the early middle ages by moving beyond traditional assumptions about the essential differences between judaism and christianity this volume thus attempts to open the way for a more nuanced understanding of the history of these two religions and the constantly changing yet always meaningful relationship between them

relations between christians and jews over the past two thousand years have been characterised to a great extent by mutual distrust and by christian discrimination and violence against jews in recent decades however a new spirit of dialogue has been emerging beginning with an awakening among christians of the jewish origins of christianity and encouraging scholars of both traditions to work together an introduction to jewish christian relations sheds fresh light on this ongoing interfaith encounter exploring key writings and themes in jewish christian history from the jewish context of the new testament to major events of modern times including the rise of ecumenism the horrors of the holocaust and the creation of the state of israel this accessible theological and historical study also touches on numerous related areas such as jewish and interfaith studies philosophy sociology cultural studies international relations and the political sciences

an honest probing look at the dynamics of the new testament in relation to problems that disconcert jews and christians today despite the new testament s impact on jewish history virtually all jews avoid knowledge of its underlying dynamics jewish families and communities thus remain needlessly stymied when responding to a deeply christian culture their christian friends meanwhile are left perplexed as to why jews are wary of the gospel s good news this long awaited volume offers an unprecedented solution oriented introduction to jesus and paul the gospels and revelation leading jews out of anxieties that plague them and clarifying for christians why jews draw back from christians sacred writings accessible to laypeople scholars and clergy of all faiths innovative teaching aids make this valuable resource ideal for rabbis ministers and other educators topics include the gospels romans and revelation the key concerns for jews misusing the talmud in gospel study jesus trial the virgin birth and empty tomb enigmas millennialist scenarios and missionary encroachment the last supper and church seders is the new testament antisemitic while written primarily with jews in mind this groundbreaking volume will also help christians understand issues involved in the origin of the new testament the portrayal of judaism in it and why for centuries their good news has been a source of fear and mistrust among jews

this volume brings together a selection of papers presented at two conferences on jewish christian interaction in antiquity held in leuven and aix en provence in 2013 and 2014 it aims to introduce a different approach to this crucial topic and some new issues following from this specialists of ancient judaism early christianity patristics late antiquity rabbinic studies papyrology epigraphy hagiography and gnosticism have focused on such topics as the consequences of the jewish wars for the relations between jews and christians in palestina the cultural and religious exchange between the two communities in alexandria smyrna syria the jewish christian polemics in rabbinic literature the papyrological and epigraphic evidences of the jewish and christian presence in egypt and rome the coexistence of jews and christians in northern italy hispania north africa gaul etc the papers are arranged chronologically from the 1st to the 7th century ce as well as geographically the eastern and western part of the roman empire the volume offers both general surveys and case studies each of them exploring different aspects of jewish christian interaction

when christians learn about jewish tradition and history they see the bible and the life of jesus with a new and enriched perspective knowing more about judaism brings them closer to jesus because jesus lived and died as a jew and consistently quoted the jewish scripture and stories in this book evan moffic popular rabbi author and guide to jewish wisdom for people of all faiths continues the what every christian needs to know about series with an exploration of the wisdom and traditions of judaism rabbi moffic provides answers to hundreds of questions he receives about judaism to provide a deeper understanding of the roots shared by christians and jews through this book s explorations readers will learn insights of the great jewish sages to live a richer and more meaningful life soak up the wisdom and traditions of judaism and a develop closer relationship with god my hope is that these teachings can serve as a way of fostering bonds focused not on the past and the troubled history between jews and christians but rather one looking forward to a future in which we share wisdom with one another

the second edition of jews christians muslims a comparative introduction to monotheistic religions compares judaism christianity and islam using seven common themes which are equally relevant to each tradition provoking critical thinking this text addresses the cultural framework of religious meanings and explores the similarities and differences among judaism christianity and islam as it explains the ongoing process of interpretation in each religion the book is designed for courses in western and world religions

in the period of roman domination there were communities of jews some still in palestine some dispersed in and around the roman empire they had to face at first the world wide power of the pagan romans and later on the emergence of christianity as an empire wide religion how they coped with these dramatic changes and how they influenced the new forms of religious life that emerged in this period provide the main themes of the jews among pagans and christians essays by the

leading scholars in the field together with the introduction by the editors offer new approaches to understanding the role of judaism and the pattern of religious interaction characteristic of the period

what were jews saying and doing about the followers of jesus in the first two centuries in this provocative and comprehensive study claudia setzer argues persuasively that jews saw the early followers of jesus as jews for some time after the christians viewed themselves as separate from the larger jewish communities this book provides historical context and nuanced exegesis of texts that continue to be trouble spots in jewish christian relations it illuminates the diverse strands of early anti judaism while providing the reader with some surprises

often the differences between the three abrahamic religions judaism christianity and islam seem more obvious than their commonalities leading to the question do we worship the same god can the answer be yes without denying our differences this volume brings jewish christian and muslim philosophers and theologians together to answer this question offering rare insight into how representatives of each religion view the other monotheistic faiths each of their contributions uniquely approaches the primary question from a philosophical perspective that is informed by the practice of worship and prayer concepts covered include sameness and oneness the nature of god epistemology and the trinity do we worship the same god models serious minded honest and respectful interreligious dialogue and gives us new ways to address an ongoing question

the author marks the end of world war ii as the closing of an important period of history and the possible new beginning for the jewish people the church and the world at large he cites two events as of major importance the creation of the jewish state of israel and the second vatican counsel he takes a look at the evolution of a new kind of judaism that is more tolerant and accepting of jesus as jew just as the church intensifies its commitment to judaeo christian dialogue originally published by baker book house in 1981

this book records the reflections and dialogue of nine distinguished scholars who by exploring past and present relationships between christians and jews are enhancing the search for new means of communication and the development of a future in which jewish christian bonds are stronger and closer

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
